Your child may struggle to read due to learning differences, but they are able to comprehend information way above their ability to decode words. With Learning Ally audio books for your family, they bridge this gap with human-read books. As a result, now struggling readers can access and absorb the classic books they want to read or need to read for school. The best audiobook app helps your kids, regardless of grade-level, thrive in the classroom and beyond.

Fostering Independence

Becoming a licensed driver is one of the greatest forms of independence and eagerly anticipated by high school students. While it may be a rite of passage for most teens, as we know, that is not the case for our students. One author states that “a visual impairment can raise feelings of deprivation and incompetence when a teenager cannot do everything his or her friends are doing.” This is why it is important to have open and honest discussions, both at home and school, about what teens face. For example, I do not look at it as just the responsibility of the orientation and mobility specialist to provide them with the skills necessary to travel and function independently. It is up to us as well to take any opportunity that arises on any of these issues and to make it a teachable moment. I encourage you to do the same at home. I believe we should reinforce the skills they learn in O&M. I think teaching across the curriculum applies to all courses, not just core classes. It is also my belief that parents should experience some O&M training as well just so they can get a glimpse of what their child experiences while navigating various environments.

Some solutions to this perceived barrier are O&M training, public transportation, consistent schedules of transportation, and finding alternative ways to commemorate the beginning of adulthood. At school, orientation and mobility training equips the students with the tools to travel without assistance. While at home, families of visually impaired students can take the young person to register to vote, they can arrange a trip to visit a friend, allow the teen to volunteer, run errands with you, or even shop independently. You can also make arrangements with friends who do drive.

The need for a driver’s license is not as great in an urban area because public transportation is available, however in a rural setting the teen may not have many, if any options for public transportation. In that case, if Ride Share services such as Uber or Lyft are available, a lesson in requesting a ride is another tool towards fostering independence. We can prepare students for independence without the ability to drive a car by giving them the O&M skills they need, by finding alternative ways to celebrate certain rites of passage, and by allowing them to be as independent as they can whenever possible. How can you assist your child with their travel skills and growing independence?


