


challenged them to achieve and surpass those ideals! Mr. Caldwell is in the business of empowering others to grow, experience, and share forward!

Transition Talk

Teaching Our Students How to Ask for Help

The simple task of asking for help can be a challenge for many people. For students who have a visual impairment, this could be equally challenging when you are uncertain as to what type of assistance you may need to complete a task or to gain information. At GAB, teaching students how to appropriately request assistance is embedded in every class, every day. We also provide our students with opportunities that requires them to have to determine not only how to ask for help, but also how to be specific in the requesting the right type of help according to their need. For example, we may have students who are low vision but still require accommodations to view their assignments. In this instance, the student is taught what type of low vision tools and accommodations are available and how they work so when needed, the student will know how and what to request to access their assignments.

Self-advocacy skills do not necessarily come naturally, however. Students must learn when to ask for help and from whom, as well as how to request assistance assertively and appropriately. Furthermore, most students with vision impairments need to practice this skill in order to become comfortable asking for help, as the prospect can be quite unnerving for many (Perkins, 2022).

At home: Request assistance related to the student's vision impairment

Example: Family member asks the child to do a task that is not readily accessible (i.e start the dishwasher when the buttons do not yet have bump dots. The child must ask for help in learning the buttons or in marking them for future accessibility.

At school:

Ask for assistance when the issue is related to the student's vision impairment or additional disabilities.

Example: Teacher passes out a worksheet to the class but does not readily provide it in an accessible format. The student needs to ask for assistance to access the material. This can be done either directly in class or in private with the teacher afterward, depending on the student's preference and comfort level.

In the community:

Ask for help from a community member on a task that is not related to the student's vision impairment or additional disabilities.

o Example: Student asks an employee at a local grocery store if the store carries a certain product and where the item can be found.
