

Transition Talk

Dear Parents/Guardians,

As you begin to think about your student transitioning from school to postsecondary options, GAB would like to introduce you to an additional service that your student may be eligible for. This service is Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Services. Vocational Rehabilitation (VR) provides services to help eligible persons with disabilities prepare for, start, and maintain competitive employment. The goal of VR is to assist students after they leave high school to become productive and independent citizens in their communities.

VR offers many services such as:

Counseling and Guidance

Postsecondary Support

Supported Employment

Work Readiness Training

Work Adjustment Training

Vocational Training

On-the-job training

To receive VR services, your student needs to be on a caseload. If you would like to begin the process for your student to be placed on the VR caseload, please email me at ajackson@doe.k12.ga.us and I will send you the Transition Parental Permission form. Please complete this form and return it to me, Alicia M. Jackson, and I will then send the paperwork to GVRA for processing. I also encourage you to contact

Ms. Jennifer Arnold, GVRA Counselor at 478-245-7576 (c) or 478-953-1095 (office) to begin the process of ensuring that your child is on the GVRA caseload and to gain additional information regarding their services. For your student, time is of the essences for these services to be in place before they graduate.



We are going to be able to set another goal before the end of this school term!


I am so thankful for all your support. This money is earned is used for field trips with our students.
